Jayne Elizabeth Zanglein is Professor, Business Administration and Law, at Western Carolina University. Previously she served as Provost of the National Labor College and was the J. Hadley Edgar Professor of Law at Texas Tech University School of Law. Before joining academia, Professor Zanglein was an ERISA practitioner, heading the ERISA Department at Vladeck, Waldman, Elias & Engelhard and serving as in-house counsel and plan administrator for a Taft-Hartley plan. She started her ERISA career in 1977, as an Employee Benefits Specialist for the Labor Management Service Administration, the precursor to the Employee Benefits Security Administration (EBSA). She has served on various task forces including Governor Cuomo’s Task Force on Pension Fund Investments. She has developed a national trustee education program on behalf of the U.S. Center for Working Capital and has worked with South African trustees and the government of Ontario on pension reform. Professor Zanglein has authored several books on pension investments and has written extensively on other ERISA issues. She edits National Underwriter’s *Tax Facts*.

Sean M. Anderson is a Teaching Assistant Professor at the University of Illinois College of Law. Since joining the Illinois faculty in 2007, he has taught courses in Employee Benefits, Legal Writing, Appellate Advocacy, and Estates and Trusts. He has joined David A. Pratt and Andrew W. Stumpff as co-author of *Pension and Employee Benefits Law* and co-editor of *Pension and Employee Benefit Statutes and Regulations* and has consulted with the U.S. Secretary of Labor on the subject of employee ownership.
